



Envision Canada helps identify, equip, and launch future missional leaders who will innovate, establish, and strengthen communities of faith in Canada and worldwide. Envision connects young adults to unique experiences that prepare them for global careers, church leadership, and deeper intimacy with Jesus.

Digital Strategy finds ways to enhance technology resources to enhance the effectiveness of various ministries across the organization.

Our National Networks: National Youth, National Children, The Women in Leadership Collective, Power team, and Chaplain's Network.

British Columbia and the Yukon

Maple Ridge

Maple Ridge Good News, a New Venture, started in the Fall of 2022 through the vision of Pastor Paul Chui and the leadership of Pastor Wai Fong, both from Westwood Alliance Church in Coquitlam. As the two leaders tracked emerging demographic trends, they noticed that a new wave of Chinese immigrants was moving into Maple Ridge—a predominantly Caucasian city without a Chinese-speaking congregation.

Pastor Tom Blackaby approached Pastor Tom with the idea of partnership. Soon the two communities, Westwood and Maple Ridge Alliance Church, mapped a plan to reach and serve the new Chinese immigrants. As Maple Ridge opened their doors and ministry programs, Pastor Fong and Westwood Alliance provided the teams and vision.

Maple Ridge Good News is a unique and hopeful partnership between Maple Ridge Alliance church—an established and predominantly Caucasian congregation—and Westwood Alliance church with Cantonese, Mandarin and English congregations. The partnership also includes the CCACA—our Association of Chinese Alliance Churches—and the Canadian Pacific District.

The New Venture is still young, but it already demonstrates the opportunities in Canada to serve and reach our new Canadians and what can happen when churches from different cultural backgrounds serve together.





Western Canadian District

Alberta and Northwest Territories

Linden Alliance

Linden Alliance is a small community of about 900 people, surrounded by small communities, and situated about an hour northwest of Calgary.

The community has a significant historical Mennonite presence, and there's a large influx of people from around the world, including Mexico, India, and Korea.

While the community is small, the church is growing weekly—with more and more people coming to faith. What began as a small church is now a consistent community of approximately 150 people.

Many people in the community navigating mental health and addiction issues appreciate the church's humble posture. The lead pastor, Jorge Santana, says they're not a perfect church, "but we just try and help people see Jesus."

Lives are changing; Nicole saw an online sermon and prayed for the first time. Since then, she's stopped dealing drugs, was baptized, and brought her friends and family to church. An Alcoholics Anonymous group started in the church, and everyone in the program came to her baptism.

The church isn't only reaching people in Linden. While nations are coming to Linden, the livestream reaches people in India, Australia, New Zealand, and the USA. Linden Alliance has helped over ten local churches with live streaming and using new technology to reach those who do not know Christ.

Pastor Jorge says, "It's a fresh wind" for their church, and the Spirit is evidently guiding this church to serve its community.

Canadian Midwest District

Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Nunavut, and northwestern Ontario

Living Hope Alliance, Arabic Church

Waddah is a Syrian gentleman who started visiting the Arabic Church of Regina regularly in 2020. He lived in the same apartment as Fadl, a leader in the Arabic Church, and the two became friends.

Fadl invited Waddah to church, who would sit alone and vanish as soon as church ended.

One day in 2032, during a visit with church members, Waddah shared that Islam has 32 denominations, and his branch of Islam believes that Jesus is the son of God. They kept visiting, he kept attending church, and Waddah visited Fadl in his home.


In March 2022, Waddah accepted Christ as his Saviour. While reading the Bible, Waddah realized that Jesus would forgive him for the terrible things he had done, unlike Islam, where he would have to perform an abundance of good deeds to tip the scale in his favour.

Waddah woke up at 4 a.m. each morning to read his Bible and read it three times, cover to cover, within one year. In September 2022, he asked to be baptized. The church leaders were unsure if he knew what he was asking for, but after reading Scripture with Waddah in his apartment, they agreed that he was ready to be baptized.


In October 2022, Waddah was baptized at Living Hope Alliance Church. Waddah is hungry for the Word and is discipled by Fadl regularly.

Ten months after realizing his sins are forgiven through trusting in Jesus, on January 29, 2023, Waddah preached a sermon titled Looking for the Lord's Return.

Owen Sound

"... I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me" 2 Cor. 12:9.

Jeff Sensentein started his tenure as lead pastor of Owen Sound Alliance Church in 2013. His priority has always been the well-being of the church. Like any good pastor, Jeff wanted to lead well and did just that throughout his decade in Owen Sound.

In 2017, Ryan Tudor joined the OSAC staff and began serving as youth pastor.

Some time later, Jeff felt a prompting from the Lord. If the church's well-being was the priority, what would it look like for Jeff to end his time at Owen Sound well?

Through the guidance of the Holy Spirit, Jeff began a period of discernment in what good succession could look like. And so, after a unanimous decision by the board of elders and Ryan's agreement, Jeff began transitioning out of the senior pastor role as Ryan stepped into it.

Ryan officially became the senior pastor in March of 2022 through a twoyear process. After being mentored by Jeff, carried along by the elders, and celebrated by the congregation, what began in April of 2020, came to fruition.

Owen Sound Alliance passed the baton of leadership, helped Jeff end well, and welcomed Ryan into his new role leading the church without losing too much momentum.

Jeff started succession planning, not out of concern for his career or because he felt he wasn't leading Owen Sound Alliance as best as he could. But by following the Spirit, Jeff could discern that it was necessary for the church to continue to grow and serve the community.

Succession planning doesn't have to be scary; it can be an essential part of church planning, regardless of whether the senior pastor ends their time at the church in 12 months or 12 years.

Eastern Canadian District

Eastern Ontario and the Atlantic Provinces

Renfrew Church @ The Table

Bryan and Susan Levert served as international workers in Thailand through a different organization. As they were finishing their ministry there and heading back to Canada, they were discerning and praying about where to go next, and they heard the Lord saying, "Renfrew."

Just 45 minutes north of Ottawa, Renfrew is a small town of 7000. While the Leverts didn't know where the town was, they sensed God leading them there, and so in early 2020 moved. They felt they were to gather people around their dinner table, show hospitality, and invite them to journey in life together.

God guided them to The Alliance in a period of discerning who to partner with and what denomination would be a good fit for a ministry like this. They connected to Jay Williamson, who was previously involved in New Ventures.

After connecting with Jay, it was apparent that God was guiding this ministry.

During COVID, unable to invite people into their homes, they rented a building from the town. People showed up simply by word of mouth, inviting those who didn't have a spiritual home.

In the first meeting, one lady said as soon as she walked in, she felt the love of God, never really feeling it before.

The Leverts are seeing an openness to different expressions of the church. People are coming who wouldn't enter a traditional church. By breaking bread with neighbours, the name of Jesus is shared, and people are coming to know Him.

Alliance Justice and Compassion

We are so grateful for the response from our Alliance family in 2022 that has enabled us to provide financial resources for our partners in Poland to respond to the needs of Ukrainians who have had to flee their country because of the war.

We partnered with the Church of Christ in Poland and the local Christian relief organization, Dobro Czynic, which translates to "Good Works Mission." Food assistance, clothing, shelter, trauma counselling, thirteen child centres for education and recreation, translation equipment for churches, and media outreach programming have all served to minister to Ukrainians in Poland. More recently, tons of food, winter clothing, and generators were purchased and transported to churches in Ukraine to allow them to serve those still in Ukraine experiencing displacement, lack of power, hunger, and many other needs. Of course, our partners are committed to bringing material aid and taking outreach opportunities—introducing thousands of Ukrainians to the living hope that only Christ can provide.

We praise God that we still have plenty of funds in the Global Emergency Response Fund that will allow us to continue to support the ongoing needs as this war continues. We invite you to regularly pray for the war to end and that God would sustain our partners as they tirelessly care for their Ukrainian guests and neighbours.

Indigenous women and girls in Canada.



For the past seven years, Envision Canada has helped identify, equip, and launch future missional leaders who innovate, establish, and strengthen communities of faith in Canada and worldwide.

We've done this by connecting young adults to unique experiences that prepare them for global careers, church leadership, and a deeper life with Jesus.

This past year, we relaunched several international initiatives—including short-term trips and internships. One of the highlights was our Justice Semester 2022 in Phuket, Thailand.

Five Canadian students joined the For Freedom International ministry team for twelve weeks of intensive learning and living in Thailand. While receiving solid biblical instruction, making new friends, and learning how to adventure deeper with Jesus, these students had the opportunity to discover the heart of God for a broken world.


This is what a couple of our JSEM students had to say about their experience:

Church Development

This year, we visited Central Asia to assess a partnership with a training facility that specializes in hosting and training believers from Muslim backgrounds from both the Arabian Peninsula and the Persian and Turkic belt. The believers who attend receive intensive discipleship and training, so that when they return to their home countries, they feel equipped to reach their own people with the Gospel and create multiplying faith communities.


Many of the surrounding countries are closed to traditional missions, and have anti-conversion laws in place, making it difficult for Muslim background believers to gather and be trained. Their governments actively arrest and jail those who renounce Islam until they recant their new-found faith. In many of these countries, believers are martyred for turning to Jesus—often by their own families.

The Central Asian country provides a safe, neutral space for them to meet. It isn't uncommon for believers to meet—for the first time—other Christians from their own country; the risk of being found out by their families, their communities, and the government prevented them from sharing openly. Meeting other believers just like them helps them develop trusting relationships they can rely on for support when they return to their home country.

Training centres and partners like this allows The Alliance Canada to contribute to the strengthening, growth, and multiplication of local churches among people groups who, for many years, have had little to no access to Jesus.

Marketplace

Harvey, Strategic Director

Marketplace international workers are people with professional employment who live as faithful ambassadors of Christ in their international workplace and community. Canadian Alliance churches and our international teams provide care, community, and coaching in their disciple-making efforts. Currently, 16 Alliance people are part of this pathway.

G and N have worked in a significant Gulf region hospital since 2019. N has been working to establish a speech therapy clinic that serves the local community. The therapist team she has developed and nurtured has experienced the way of Jesus. However, her professionalism and character, which has, in turn, influenced their way of serving the community. G has used his sports therapy skills outside of his hospital work to build connections and bring the presence of Christ to the regional and international sporting community. G and N also help coach and support other Alliance Marketplace people in the region.

Arun works in South Asia with a Canadian Oil company. After navigating the social and business challenges of COVID, he and his wife Anna were finally able to open their home and lives in the neighbourhood. Many conversations and meals later, they started an Alpha course.

After the second Alpha session, at a separate social gathering, they received strong encouragement from a non-attendee who mentioned how special the first two sessions had been for his wife. Arun and Anna invited him to attend in the future, and he was very enthusiastic and planned to attend! Other couples are hearing about the good things happening for those in the Alpha group. Plans are underway to launch an Alpha specifically for couples.

Whether in Canada or around the world, we are all disciple-makers. To 'go overseas,' you don't have to become someone or something else to bring Christ to the nations. Go with your profession. Be Christ in your workplace and community.
